# Known and Loved, by God and Each Other

Author and researcher Dr. Brené Brown has spent the last 13 years studying vulnerability, courage, worthiness, and shame. She describes her discoveries in all of her books and she is refreshingly honest about how her scientific study of human behavior has changed her own life. Dr. Brown began her work trying to understand why some people were very resilient to life experiences of shame or failure, and other people were very brittle. As she collected her data, listening to story after story of people's lives, she began to compose a list of traits that she described as "whole-hearted" from the people who were resilient. And other folks, who were "hustling for worthiness" had a list of traits that were often the exact opposite of whole-hearted living. As Brené looked at those two lists, she came to the painful realization that her own life resembled more closely the list of brittle, shame-compromised people and she was not living a whole-hearted existence. It is always tough when your own research comes back to bite you.

Dr. Brown was discovering that the antidote to shame is not hiding, being perfect, or trying harder to please others, but instead being vulnerable. Shame loves the darkness and breeds in isolation—but being vulnerable in the light of day with someone who has earned the right to hear your story will kill shame fast. The more I read her books and listened to her TED Talks, the more I recognized our own Christian story of salvation. Jesus

invites us to stop hiding and instead come openly to his table for nurture and living water. Be vulnerable in the presence of Christ so that you can be known and loved. The more we open up and trust the unconditional love of God, the more we experience the joy of being wholehearted. Hiding is not good for the soul.

The role of a Christian community is to create a safe

place to practice knowing and loving one another. Out in the world, you cannot always depend on people to be their best selves. But in the context of our church, we are developing the skills of Christ so that we can be Christ to one another. Don't judge, listen carefully, offer hospitality, apologize when you hurt

someone, respect the dignity of every human being . . . you know, our baptismal covenant. We are striving to create a safe space where it is normal to know each other and love each other; this kind of holy vulnerability and courage is where resurrection happens. Being known and loved are the ingredients for salvation and transforming the world. This is what the kingdom of heaven looks like here on earth as it is in heaven.


## Challenging the Politics of Division

First, a confession. For several years in my ordained ministry following seminary, I carefully avoided preaching on most of the controversial issues facing our country. Judging from the silence in my sermons, you would have thought our Lord Jesus would frown on his followers speaking to the political culture of our times, and the Christian gospel has practically nothing to say about how to govern ourselves as a just and democratic society.

The reasons for my silence were neither indecipherable nor noble. In truth, I was scared. I chickened out from saying anything that would rile up the congregants in my small church who represented the diversity of political and social views that the national polls say continue to divide us today. I liked my job, I liked getting paid, and I liked being liked. So, I found creative ways to step around saying anything that would upset a particular voting bloc in my church—be it liberal or conservative, Democrat or Republican, progressive or traditionalist.

And yet, Jesus himself was "political." By that I do not mean he aligned himself with a certain party, nor did he propose purely political solutions for the social problems of his day. Jesus was, of course, supremely a spiritual and religious figure in the lineage of the Hebrew prophets before him. But it is undeniable that the life and ministry of our Lord put him in con-

flict with the political powers and values of his culture. The gospel Jesus and his followers proclaimed had inevitable ramifications for how society was to be organized for the benefit of the people.



The current political season is marked by fear, anger, mistrust and division. The values of Christian gospel, however, are characterized by the "fruit of the Spirit" in St. Paul's Letter to the Galatians: "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control." (5:22-23) The politics of Jesus, no matter what social or economic policies are being espoused or denounced, demand these values undergird both the tone of the political conversation and its proposed outcomes.

Shouldn't the politics of Jesus move us to judge what our political candidates say about their opponents, how they talk about "others," and if their economic and social policies are based on the kind of gospel values that St. Paul commended?

If so, then we should talk about these things in church. But given our current sour political climate, how? At the risk of being attacked for being overly simplistic, I humbly offer the following ground rules. I offer these for both ordained clergy

as they preach and for those in the congregation as they listen.

A guideline for preachers

- Always preach the gospel. Respect the pulpit; don't view it as your personal political platform.
- Speak as one informed witness to Christ's gospel, acknowledging there are other witnesses.
- Remind your listeners that this is the beginning of a conversation you want to have with them, not the end of a needed conversation.
- Show some courage. It's easier in the long run for your pastoral ministry than cowardice.
- Be willing to listen, be willing to change your mind, be willing to repent.

A word to listeners

- Cut your preachers some slack. They really are trying to say and do the right thing.
- Acknowledge in yourself that Jesus was both a spiritual and a political teacher.
- Read the cited Scriptures, and have the conversation with God and with others that the preacher is inviting you to have.
- Be willing to listen, be willing to change your mind, be willing to repent.

If our churches in the Diocese of Maryland can put into practice the gospel-infused values of Jesus, then we can show the world another model of political discourse in this divisive season, one based on "striving for justice and peace among all people, and respecting the dignity of every human being." (Book of Common Prayer, page 417)

Then I got a text, "Hi Niki, I just left you a voicemail about Ralph. Not sure if you received it, wanted to make sure that you got the info. He's broken his ankle and is being taken to the hospital. Paramedics are here with him now." I was relieved that it was 'just a broken ankle' — I rushed out of the meeting to see what I could do to help him. The details of the rest of the evening will never leave me.

As many of you know, it was much more than a broken ankle. Without the heroic actions of fellow travelers on the journey, Ralph may not still have his foot and I may not still have Ralph.

The woman on the bike who called and texted had also called 911. The shirtless man pacing at the scene had used

his shirt as a tourniquet and literally saved Ralph's life. The paramedics who decided that the helicopter was the best option to get my husband to a place where medical professionals would employ their God-given gifts to lead us to the best possible outcome. Rev. Adrien who held my hand while we waited for Ralph to be transported to the helicopter. Dear friends and strangers who prayed when they saw the emergency vehicles and watched the medivac lift off from the field at Frederick High. My dear friend and honorary brother who dropped everything to drive me to Baltimore that night, and sit with me and my son while we waited. The many hands from All Saints' who prepared the meals waiting on our doorstep when we came home from the hospital three days later, that were the nourishment for our bodies and spirits through those early days and weeks. Those who visited at lunch time, or gave encouraging calls, cards and text messages.

In this month of thanksgiving, in this season of stewardship, I am overwhelmed and awed by the ways in which our community is woven into our lives and has worked to hold us up through it all. Ralph and I are so incredibly grateful. The journey of healing continues—when we are discouraged, we continue to look to the community of faith in which we are forever woven, for strength, peace and God's healing, protecting love.
