What Gift Do You Bring? What Gift Do You Receive?

Do you remember how you were taught to receive a gift when you were a child? Do you remember being coached to hold out your hands, palms up? You waited patiently until the one giving you the gift placed it into your hands. Before you did anything that looked too eager, you gave thanks to the gift giver and then you began to carefully unwrap your gift, treating it with care.

There is an etiquette to giving and receiving a gift. We don't grab. We don't forget the gift giver as soon as we are enamored with the gift. And we don't treat the gift as something we expected. Instead, it is an un-merited surprise. The gift is evidence of the grace-filled abundance of our relationship. Gifts that we give and receive become even more valuable because they create a relationship of gratitude between us.

Over the past 6 months, I have been reading a book that Tommy Turbyville recommended by Lewis Hyde called "The Gift". Hyde traces human behavior patterns around gift giving in many different cultures. He notices that gifts are meant to keep moving from hand to hand. A gift is supposed to be in circulation. If it grows stagnant or is hoarded, then the gift turns into a curse or it loses its value. Gifts mark transitions and help us cross thresholds like birthdays and anniversaries and memorializing the deceased. Gifts cannot be commoditized into currency. It's worth is determined by the people and relationships the gift bonds together.

When I teach people how to receive communion, I often say, "Hold out your hands like you would receive a gift. The Body of Christ is a gift, freely given to you." To add Hyde's insights to the gift of communion, we consume the gift so that it can be used to empower us and send us out in the world. Because of the gift, our lives are bonded with Jesus, the gift giver. The gratitude we feel inspires us to go and share our gift with others so it never becomes stagnant. In essence, this is the theology of stewardship. All that we have is a gift from God, given into our open and outstretched hands. We, in turn, have a gift to give away in gratitude for the gifts we have received.

After reading Hyde, I am more and more convinced that it is our gifts that bind us together into the church. Perhaps, the gift you exchange with others is not an object wrapped in pretty paper, tied up with ribbon. Perhaps, the gift you bring is laughter? Maybe you share the gift of cooking? Perhaps, you are the one who brings a listening heart? Or silence? Or music?

Are your hands open? Are you ready to receive the gift that has been brought for you? Are you carrying a gift that would bless the community of All Saints' and the outstretched hands of someone ready to receive? Come to our parish retreat day on September 2 and we will celebrate the gifts of our community.



The Seeds of Ministry: Reflecting on Ministry Moments

Reflecting on the Editor's note from last month's Stewardship article, I counted over twenty Ministries listed in the bulletin. This summer we have heard from many involved in those ministries during the Opening Welcome of our services. Our goal is to inform the parish about the different ways folks can be involved, and give them a name and face to connect with. Most importantly, it's our way of sowing seeds out into the community so that new growth and connections can spring forth from the rich soil of this congregation.

Ah, but maybe your soil isn't feeling too rich. This is where the best transformations happen! By lending that bit of time; setting the table for the services through Altar Guild, quietly arranging flowers for Flower Guild, helping to teach a children's Formation Class, reaching out to homebound parishioners through the Care Teams, knitting a prayer shawl for those looking for comfort (such as a toddler being adopted from India, or someone getting through a round of chemo), or even talking through ideas with the Stewardship Committee for how to invite our community to prayerfully consider their contribution of treasure for the Pledge Drive, there are so many ways to connect and heal the worn out ground in our own hearts.

One way personal remembrances of our hearts are often celebrated and acknowledged, that I wanted to mention in my Ministry Moment for Flower Guild, is through donations for the arrangements. These are printed in the weekly bulletins where we can recognize, as a community, the celebrations of life, along with the memories of loved ones, or any other occasion we want to lift up. These donations help support the budget of the Flower Guild for the gorgeous blooms, and materials and supplies associated with the arrangements. In turn, this takes some burden off operating budget for these resources.

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DID YOU KNOW?

The three buildings comprising our campus were built over a 186 year period. The Court Street building, which includes the Parish hall, was built in 1814; the Upjohn gothic-designed historic church, facing Church Street, in 1855; and the Campus Center and Great Hall building in 2000. The three buildings combined have 44,000 square feet of usable space. That's equivalent to about 20 typical Frederick homes.

Each building has different designs, construction methods, materials and maintenance needs.

It costs, on average, \$150,000 each year for maintenance, utilities and insurance to keep all the facilities ready to serve our numerous uses. Just the utilities; electricity, gas and technology services are \$45,000 each year. All contracts are competed to assure best value.

Each building has its own unique heating and air conditioning systems. If there are equipment breakdowns, in addition to normal maintenance, then costs exceed the planned budget. In the past year, we have had to replace and relocate air conditioning compressors, replace commercial grade appliances, repair storm damage, and upgrade our computer systems. For example, the computer systems and software were so out of date, the manufacturers had stopped supporting them about five years earlier. Had the systems stopped working during that period, all information, dating back about 20 years, could have been lost.

Fortunately the professional staff and the Buildings and Ground Committee are good, prudent and conscientious stewards of the facilities and resources. Also, the "Over

**'PRESENT DAY': Healing Male
Childhood Sexual Abuse**

All Saints' will host a presentation and discussion on August 23 at 7:30 p.m. about a very sensitive and not-so-often discussed topic—male childhood sexual abuse. The presentation will be led by a parishioner, who is a survivor, and is answering a call to share his healing journey story and help others with theirs. There is an astonishing number of men impacted by this violation against them as innocent children, and many often live in silence and shame for decades. There are some quite surprising statistics: Many are well aware of prostate cancer and the efforts to battle the disease. It is estimated that number of men impacted by childhood sexual abuse is 1 in 6, which is about the same as prostate cancer, 1 in 7. Yet, male childhood sexual abuse is a topic rarely discussed. Many of these male victims struggle with life challenges daily and post-traumatic stress. There is often limited local community resources to support these men. Efforts have been made in our schools to educate children, but local, grassroots support is often limited. To further the effort for this critical and healing need, we are starting a men's survivor support group beginning in September. The group will meet the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month. This will be a safe and confidential place for men to share in healing and community. To the survivors, please know, you are not alone. We are in need of a male therapist to help guide the group, and welcome support from all to help secure a therapist. For more information, please contact Doug Tinder, 242daytime @gmail.com.

STEWARDSHIP AND ADMINISTRATION

THE THEOLOGY OF MONEY

All Saints' Church, like all human institutions, is made up of people who are suspended in webs of significance and meaning. These webs are both physical and relational: we use them to form the mental maps we have about the church—to locate ourselves in the physical space of the buildings and grounds (where is the Great Hall?), and to understand the complex and interlocking system of relationships with other people in the community (who is the rector?). Sometimes areas of the map are not well understood or clear. Or sometimes, from long habits of use, people forget how they relate to the larger system at all. Imagine those parts of the world map that are unclear to you, those unexplored territories—maybe Antarctica. Do you find yourself getting curious, kindling in you a sense of adventure and wonder? Or do those unknown and unexplored places on your world map generate a little anxiety—a tingle of fear?

I think the handling of money, and how we treat our money is one of those unexplored territories of our church—a place on the map where only a small number of us have been, a relatively blank space on the map, and perhaps a place where, in our imagination, unknown dangers lurk. For many years, that part of the map was so stable and well taken care of that we didn't have to think about it. Dunbar Ashbury and Christy Essey tended to it, and the rest of us focused on other things. A bit of an exaggeration perhaps, but when Dunbar and Christy stepped away from their roles in the church, we continued operating on unexamined assumptions, without having an accurate picture of how that part of the church is put together. We never learned the contours, or even how to navigate in that part our church — and that has led to problems. In the last months, a lot has happened to help us to understand the resources and the handling of money at All Saints':

An internal audit was conducted for the years 2013 and 2014. The audit committee made up of Bill Gibb, Kay Kitchen, Travis Gibb, Richard McCain, Hunt Hendrickson, and Betty Hedges provided an in-depth report on their findings, and we now have a accurate snapshot of the material resources, the documentation, and the processes that are used to manage them. With these years now completed, we can more easily embark on auditing 2015 and 2016 with a new committee. The committee also made several excellent recommendations, which the vestry will use to make informed policy decisions.

Our former treasurer Rhonda Scott, and our interim bookkeeper Debbie King, turned over many stones and identified areas where processes had broken down or were not functioning properly. From what they learned, Rhonda formulated a new model for the treasurer role (which the vestry approved) to transform it from overwhelming and consuming to a sustainable and manageable. Instead of one treasurer, we now have two permanent co-treasurer roles. One co-treasurer will help the bookkeeper, Dennis Burkhart, manage day-to-day finance operations, and the other will interface with the Vestry and

Budget & Finance, and provide budget analysis and insight to facilitate proper stewardship of our resources. Both Debbie and Rhonda (along with others from the Budget & Finance committee, and the Vestry), identified areas that need improvement, automation, and modernization. As a result, the vestry accepted their recommendation for a temporary 'process engineer' role to document these improvements, which will facilitate implementation. Mark Gibson is our new 'analysis' co-treasurer, and Kay Kitchen will be our temporary process engineer. At the time of this writing, we have not yet identified an operations co-treasurer.

Finally, the vestry has chartered a task force to work on the Theology of Money. This is a group to be composed of Vestry and Budget & Finance committee members, and interested parishioners, to work on the deeper questions of how we use our money and resources in the church, and how it does or does not reflect our values and mission as Christians. Can we align our thinking, our mental map of money, with our mission to embody the resurrection story, and to journey with resilient faith? Randy Querry is chairing this committee.

The faithful and loving service of all the people named above, and others who have not been named, is a true testament to the strength and beauty of the All Saints' community. We owe them our thanks and gratitude—thank you! I also invite you to prayerfully consider how you naturally respond to the issues around money—both when you think of it in your own life, and in the context of the church. I think as a community we should work towards having some healthy conversations around the table about money, and how we use God's gifts in the life of the church—we need an accurate, useful and Christ-centered map to help us navigate.
